Flying start for the Cambridge Sports Centre

Brick by brick, pound by pound the yet-to-be-named "Cambridge Sports Centre" has got off to a flying start. These recent photos highlight the great progress that has been made since the last issue of The Hawk when we reported that this exciting project was finally "on the starting blocks" (The Hawk, Easter 2012).



While much of the world was focused on the Olympic and Paralympic Games this summer, builders were hard at work laying the foundations, erecting the ground floor frame and starting to fit what will be a stunning arched roof. The pièce de résistance, the main sports hall at the heart of the Centre, is now taking shape: a space where over half of the University's 52 sports clubs and generations of individuals will have opportunity to train, compete, exercise or simply

enjoy watching sport from the bleacher seating, cheering on the Light Blues to victory.

"The progress, in such a short space of time, is staggering" remarks the Director of Physical Education and Sport, Tony Lemons. "It is wonderful to see it all coming together as a completely integrated building; a striking facility and one that the University will surely be proud of." Indeed, the 6,000m² building takes up a large footprint on Cambridge's West Cambridge campus, the University's hub for science and technology, which is closely linked to the existing sports grounds on Wilberforce Road and Grange Road.

The Centre is due to open its doors in October 2013, and realising its full potential will depend on a successful fundraising campaign.

The fundraising effort: high fives to Fives and Squash

Over 70 individuals have donated to the project so far, with a handful of substantial contributions from alumni. As reported previously, the University has contributed £10m to the project which has allowed the building work to commence. Although great fundraising progress has been made, much more remains to be done and the search for a Naming Gift is now underway.

Tom James does it again as Cambridge shines in Olympics



Following a year of some difficulty in which a virus threatened Tom's chances of being selected for the coxless four, he and his fellow crew won the gold to add to that won in Beijing.

In a superb piece of rowing they were in control of the race throughout. In the final 500 metres repeated attacks by the much fancied Australians failed to make any dent in the four's commanding,

and ultimately decisive, lead.

In other rowing results Tom Ransley (Hughes Hall) rowed to a bronze medal in the men's 8, while George Nash (St Catharine's) also gained a bronze in the men's pair. Anna Watkins (Newnham) won gold in the women's double sculls with Katherine Grainger, a three times silver medalist. In their extraordinary race they beat the runners-up by a full 2½ seconds.

Ian Peck, featured in the centre of that group, was the guest of honour and gave what many have called the finest speech that they have heard at the Dinner for years.

The Chairman this year is John Pritchard, long serving Dinner Secretary before Ollie Slack. John (CUBC, Robinson 1983-86, President of the Hawks' Club 1985-86) was Olympic Silver Medallist with the British Eight in Moscow 1980 as well as competing in the Eight in the Los Angeles Olympics in 1984. He rowed in The Boat Race on three consecutive occasions culminating in victory in 1986 when Cambridge denied the other place the record of the longest winning streak (Cambridge's record of 13 consecutive victories - 1924-1936) as well as preventing them winning the Ladbrokes trophy outright. John founded and runs an executive

search business, Piper Pritchard Associates, in London. He is a director of the British Olympic Association and Chairman of Right to Play, an international charity which supports children in war-torn and deprived parts of the world through sport. He is also a member of the alumni advisory board of Cambridge University.

Chris Holmes - "an inspirational speaker"

Chris Holmes is the man who led the London 2012 Paralympic Games team to stage, in the words of the IPC President, "The greatest Paralympic Games ever." He took the games to a global scale, the first games to achieve worldwide television audiences in the hundreds of millions, the first games to have all the Olympic sponsors also signed to the Paralympics and the first games to sell out all the stadia for every session.



Chris is also Britain's most successful Paralympic swimmer ever winning nine gold medals, six at a single games.

Despite losing his sight overnight aged 14, Chris gained straight A's at A level and got to Cambridge University (King's) from a comprehensive school. While still at University Chris won six gold medals at the Barcelona Games in 1992, a feat never equalled by any Briton. He went on to compete in Atlanta in 1996 and Sydney in 2000 winning a further three gold medals. He was elected a Hawk in 1998.

Prior to being Director of Paralympic Integration at London 2012 Chris was a commercial lawyer at a leading City practice. He is a Non-executive Director at UK Sport, responsible for the funding for the Great Britain Olympic and Paralympic teams who won 29 and 34 gold medals respectively at this summer's games.

Chris is a former non-executive Director of the Disability Rights Commission where he served on the board, audit and legal committees for five and a half years.

Chris was also an ambassador to the successful London 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games bid where he was closely involved in securing the top sporting prize for this country.

He is a patron of Help for Heroes, the Youth Sport Trust and the British Paralympic Association.

Over his sporting career Chris won nine Paralympic gold medals, a string of World and European titles, broke 35 World Records and aged only 20 he was awarded the M.B.E. for services to British sport.

We are honoured to have him as our speaker at the dinner this year.

4 Hawks on bikes

Between 4th-8th May earlier this year Oliver Slack (St Edmund's 97-99), Conor Davis (St Edmund's 96-98), Richard Elliott (St Edmund's 96-98) and Paul SurrIDGE (Hughes 96-98) took part in Stage 3 (<http://www.dallagliflntoff2012.com/stage3>) of the Dallaglio Flintoff Cycle Slam 2012.

Beginning in Lucca, Tuscany the journey involved an ascent over the Apennines across the farmlands and lush vineyards of Emilia Romagna, through Mantova in Lombardy, along the magnificent eastern shores of Lake Garda in the Veneto before another climb; this time, the Italian Alps and deep into the region of Trentino-Alto-Adige, passing down through the Passo del Tonale to their final destination, the ski resort in Aprica. A total journey of 562km/352miles and a total climb of 6,576m / 21,569ft over 5 days.


Freddie and Lawrence were aiming to raise £2,012 million for three charities. Between them, our four Hawks raised over £20,000. The charities involved are:

In cycling Emma Pooley (Trinity Hall), silver medal winner in Beijing, had a less successful venture, coming 6th in the Women's Time Trial on a course to which she was little suited. However she played an important supporting role in the Road Race, helping to set up Lizzie Armistead for her silver medal, the first British medal of the games.

On the track Andy Baddeley (Caius) came 8th in his 1500m semi, just missing out on a place in the final. Julia Bleasdale (Pembroke) reached both finals of the 5,000m and 10,000m, coming 8th in both, with a personal best in the latter.

Other competitors included Claire Hallissey (Robinson), 57th in the Marathon, Annie Lush (Emmanuel), reaching the quarter-finals of the Elliott 6m yachts, and Stacie Powell (Churchill),

20th in the 10m diving - just missing out on a place in the final.

Two other Cambridge alumni featured in the Olympics - Silas Stafford (Hawks, Gonville & Caius) and Jake Cornelius (Emmanuel) both rowed for USA, the former in the Men's Pair, and the latter in the Eight.

And one who didn't quite make it

The following letter was received by the Chairman of the Trustees of the Hawks Trust. In it the writer graphically reveals the pain of setting his sights on achieving a place in the Olympics and ultimately not quite being able to make the grade. The editor feels that there will be many a Hawk who, privately, will only too well understand the sentiments herein:

Dear Trustees of the Hawks Club and Charitable Trust,

I thought I'd drop you a note just to inform you with what's happened with my athletics as you, the Club and the Trust have provided me with so much help and support over the years.

Unfortunately I have not been able to find the success and fulfilment I so greatly desired from my athletics. The opportunity to be involved with the Olympics was one I could not let pass me by and I have put everything I possibly have into giving myself a chance to capitalise upon this. Saying that, there is so much more to one's decision to dedicate oneself to something and my inability to achieve any personal progression with my sport has left me very disheartened.

Athletics is very simple...you constantly strive to better your personal best. My best would have made me competitive in the Olympic trials final of the 400m hurdles but the level I've been running at this season meant I only finished 3rd in my semi-final, 0.5s behind the winner whom I needed to beat to make the final. This result obviously disappointed me but it was the realisation that I was so far off where I'd like to be and what I promised a few years ago that really hit me hard. I simply haven't responded to all the effort I've put in.

Saying that, I have no regrets with the decisions and sacrifices I've made. In 2008 I had the choice to go to the vet school or pursue my sporting dreams. Fortunately I had the support of my parents so in the end I chose athletics due to the limited timescale in sport to achieve your goals. By 2010 I unfortunately had no means to support myself anymore due to events outside of my control. Then the Hawks' Club came to my rescue and provided me with support in the form of a job, the sponsorship contacts and an award from the Trust. I was very lucky that I was considered for a 2012 award and it was a major factor in allowing me to continue in pursuit of my dream.

This support allowed me to have two very consistent injury-free years but there is much more to athletics and for whatever reason I haven't been able to rediscover the form I showed in 2007 when I was in my final year at Cambridge. I have done all I can to work out why it's not happening but an answer just seems beyond me. I have therefore decided to just try and enjoy athletics and not worry about times or set targets for myself. I realise I'm very lucky to be able to do this at all, in no small part down to you, so I really owe it to you all to just go out and enjoy running and jumping over some sticks.

It's been an absolute pleasure taking this journey with the Hawks' Club in my corner. I hope life is treating you all well and that the club goes from strength to strength.

The case of the missing President

OBITUARIES

Gordon Waddell (1937-2012)



Gordon Waddell, President 1961-2, was a member of The Invincibles, that team that famously went through the whole 1961 season without losing a game.

He was already an international, as were many others in that famous team, playing for

Scotland only one year after school. He played 18 times for Scotland and went with the British Lions to New Zealand and South Africa in 1959 and 1962.

Winner of 3 rugby blues, Waddell's role in the 1961 Varsity match was crucial. With the score poised at 3-3, he could see the opposing fly half shaping for a second drop goal (he had already scored one), and charged it down. The resulting loose ball was touched down to put Cambridge 6-3 up. Then in the dying minutes of the game Waddell himself scored a drop goal to put the game beyond doubt.

After Cambridge he did an MBA at Stanford, and played club rugby for London Scottish. In 1965 he emigrated to South Africa to marry the daughter of Harry Oppenheimer, Mary, whom he had met during the 1962 tour. They established a successful stud farm near Cape Town, and Waddell took on directorships in several Oppenheimer companies - most notably the Anglo American Corporation. That he retained these posts after his divorce from Mary was the clearest indication of the high regard in which Oppenheimer held him.

During this period he became active politically, joining the Progressive Federal Party in opposition to Apartheid, and being an MP from 1974 to 1977.

In 1987 he returned to Britain, taking on an impressive array of directorships, including Cadbury Schweppes and the Scottish National Trust. He was Chairman of Shanks, the Fairway Group, the Ryan Group, and Gartmore Scotland Investment Trust, to name but a few.

He was a keen golfer, a member of the Royal & Ancient, and the Honourable Company of Edinburgh Golfers.

He is survived by his second wife, Kathy May, two sons and three daughters.

W J (Bill) Downey (1934-2012)



Downey was an extraordinarily talented all round sportsman. At Sedbergh he held colours in Rugby and Cricket, was UK squash champion at under 16 and again at under-19, and in Tennis was the runner up in the Surrey Junior championships.

After school he did his national service with the Royal Hampshires in Malaysia, before going up to

Emmanuel to read Economics. Subsequently he switched to Law to take his degree.

He earned 4 Rugby blues 1954-57, and in the last year became Captain. His side contained four internationals, and had a brilliant season, beating all the top club sides. Alas, unlike the 1961 team, the final match, the Varsity, was not to be theirs - a loss that Downey took very hard. He served on the Hawks' Club committee for two years.

His success at University level in no way lessened his commitment to his college, gaining two Cuppers wins in Rugby and captaining the college Cricket team. He remained devoted to the college, returning frequently, even when quite ill, and not mobile.

He maintained a lifetime interest in Esher Rugby Club, and managed the golf matches of the Woodpeckers, an Oxbridge touring rugby club. He was a member of the Royal Wimbledon Golf Club, and a governor of the local primary school.

His family, Penuel, three children and five grandchildren were of great importance to him, and he had a wide circle of friends. His latter years were marred by the relentless progress of Parkinson's disease which he met with typically indomitable style.

Philip Snow (1915-2012)



The youngest brother of 3, of whom the eldest was the famous novelist C.P., Philip was himself no slouch as a writer, producing a number of volumes relating to his south sea

experiences, a two volume autobiography, and, perhaps most famously, a biography of C.P., *Stranger and Brother*.

Philip went up to Christ's in 1934 to read History. He got half-blues for Chess and Table Tennis, and played Cricket for the College. Although he never got his cricket blue, he captained the Leicestershire 2nd team for 2 years. He played a *lot* of table tennis, recording that, after 4 years of competition against his eldest brother the score was 1,759 wins for him against 1,601 for C.P.

On graduating he joined the Colonial Service and was posted to Fiji, where he was shortly joined by his fiancée, Anne Harris, whom he married on the day she arrived. He was then posted to the Lau archipelago where he was in command of some 10,000 Polynesians, with no telephone, and only a monthly boat service for any contact with his superiors.

He was soon transferred to Suva where he was involved in setting up the defenses of Nandi airport following Pearl Harbour. Here he founded the colony's first multi-racial sporting body, the Suva Cricket Association, overriding some local antipathy in the process.

Having trained the Fijian cricket team to a considerable level of competence, in 1948 he took

them on a tour of New Zealand. A source of consternation and amazement, he appeared on the field in immaculate whites, accompanied by a team, barefoot and clad in knee-length white *sulus*. This team however went on to win 3 of their 5 matches. In later life his greatest pride was, as permanent representative of Fiji on the International Cricket Conference, to get New Zealand to accept that his team of 40 years previously was in fact a first-class team. He thus became, at 74, the oldest man to become recognized as a first-class player.

In the 1950's Snow resigned from the Colonial Service and joined Rugby School as Bursar where he remained for 24 years. During this time he was responsible for organizing the visit by the Queen in 1967 to mark the 400th anniversary of the school.

On retirement he continued with his writing, contributing to the Daily Telegraph, the Dictionary of National Biography, and lugubrious entries for Barclays World of Cricket, such as the story of the cricketer in St Helena who broke his neck trying to save a ball from a waterfall at square leg.

He was appointed MBE in 1979 and OBE in 1985. His wife predeceased him in 2005, and he is survived by his daughter.

Sid Waddell (1940-2012)



Son of a Northumberland miner, he gained a scholarship to St John's to read History. A keen sportsman, he played rugby for the college, and the CU LX club, but injury cut short his career, and he never became a Hawk.

Turning his interest to Darts he inaugurated the inter-college Darts competition, and unsuccessfully campaigned to get the sport awarded a blue. Neither that refusal, nor defeat of St John's by a team of trainee vicars from Selwyn, did anything to blunt his enthusiasm for the sport though, and throughout his life he was the greatest proselytizer for the game.

Following Cambridge he moved to Durham to pursue an academic career, but winning a playwriting competition decided him to move into television. He worked on local news programmes, producing over 600 editions of *Calendar* for Yorkshire TV.

In 1974 he joined the BBC and became a highly successful creator of children's programmes, including *Jossy's Giants* which boasted over 6 million viewers. He was also the writer of *Sloggers*, a children's comedy cricket programme that earned him a nomination for an award.

It is as "the voice of darts" however that he will be best remembered. From 1978 until the very last days of his life he was the commentator of choice for the major Darts championships. His commentating style was totally over the top - "like a banshee with piles" as he described himself - which earned him a huge following. The PDC World Darts Championship trophy will, from 2013, be called the Sid Waddell trophy in his honour.


