Alastair Hignell to speak at London Dinner

There can be few, even among the pantheon of great Hawks, who have stood so tall in the sporting world as Alastair Hignell, and shown so much courage in the face of adversity. Alastair has been suffering from the progressive form of multiple sclerosis for 10 years, but he has taken it on like a rugby tackle - with full commitment!

Alastair was at Fitzwilliam 1974-77 during which time he was dual rugby and cricket blue no less than 4 times, ending up as the first ever Captain of both sports. While still at university he represented Gloucestershire at cricket, and won 10 England caps at rugby union. Shortly after his debut for the England rugby team - a brutal encounter with Australia, the "Battle of Brisbane"



- he was playing in the Varsity cricket match, making 60 runs against an Oxford attack that included Imran Khan.



Leaving university he returned to teaching in Bristol, garnering 4 further England rugby caps, while continuing to represent Gloucestershire during the summer. In his cricketing career he notched up 11 first-class centuries in 170 matches (including one against the West Indies), and posted a top score of 149. He retired from rugby in 1979, and from cricket in 1983 having, for the third time, achieved 1,000 runs in a season.

Alastair now turned his attention to sports journalism and broadcasting, and worked for the BBC for 17 years. He rapidly became a highly respected rugby commentator, and covered every major event, both domestic and international.

He was diagnosed with multiple sclerosis in 1999; since when he has worked tirelessly to raise funds and spread awareness about the disease. In spite of the difficulties he continued broadcasting, finally retiring following the 2008 Premiership Final. He was subsequently awarded the Professional Rugby Players' Association (PRA) Blyth Spirit Award for his "remarkable courage" in battling MS and for his "tremendous contribution to rugby as both player and broadcaster". Later the same year he was awarded the Helen Rollason award in the BBC Sports Personality of the Year show for "courage and achievement in the face of adversity".

This year Alastair has been awarded CBE in the Queen's birthday honours list for services to broadcasting, and for raising funds to combat Multiple Sclerosis. We are honoured to have his presence at the dinner.

London Dinner moves to Park Lane

Regrettably the refurbishment work at the Savoy which necessitated our move last year is still not complete. So we must stay away, and this year the dinner will be held at the Intercontinental Hotel, Park Lane. Itself recently refurbished we can expect the very best in service there.

How fares the Clubhouse?

Over the years successive generations of Hawks must have grown tired of continuous exhortations from Cambridge to provide yet more financial support for the Clubhouse. Fortunately the ennui did not prevent a sizable proportion of our alumni from either signing up to an annual subscription if they were not already paying one, or staying with it if they were. The result, combined with a restructuring of the Clubhouse's modus operandi, has born fruit. This year for the first time we have been able to show a small surplus on the cash account at the end of the year, even after taking care of some fabric maintenance that was required.

This successful out-turn comes in no small way from the quality of our staff. Sarah Malcolm, our Administrator, has been with us since 2002. She has become central to everything that happens in the Club. Ostensibly her role is the administrative functions - filing, record keeping, correspondence, book keeping, etc. Sarah does far more than this, helping out in any aspect of the Clubhouse that needs it - whether prepping in the kitchen, or clearing up something unmentionable when no one else was available to do it. Indeed, during the first month of the Michaelmas term 2007 when we were without a Steward she virtually ran the place single-handed.

Our experience with Stewards has been highly variable, but for the past year we have basked in the welcoming geniality of Mike and Karen Gurney. Mike runs the bar, and general front-ofhouse. His generally laid-back approachability wins friends all over, but belies an inner steel that can be deployed if anything gets out of hand. Karen meanwhile performs wonders in the kitchen. The quality of her bar meals brings in the customers with some 50 servings per night as a regular achievement. This means that the Clubhouse is constantly a-buzz with activity, as a good club should be.



The restructuring that we undertook 3 years ago means that this Mike and Karen Gurney is all the permanent staff that we employ. We have a regular

outside caterer who is able to do functions for 15 or more - a critical adjunct to our service when Karen is being deluged by the demands of the Bar trade. Having said that, Karen herself will cater for a function where she feels that she can do so without impacting service elsewhere. Since the retained profit from using an outside caterer is very small we are constantly looking at ways of increasing Karen's role in this regard.

One other aspect of our restructuring needs mention. The Clubhouse is now open only for some 40 weeks of the year, being the full term, plus a week or so at either end, depending on our expectations of trade at those times. The dates are published in the web site, but Sarah is in attendance in the office for all but 5 weeks of the year, so any queries, bookings, etc can be addressed to her whenever she is around (see the back page for contact details). Remember, all Hawks, of any age, are most welcome to make use of the premises - please do so.

Having said that we have achieved some success in our trading account, we must re-emphasise, as we have so often before... the business of running this enterprise is highly variable and we can easily swing back from surplus to dearth. The underlying income stream represented by your subscriptions is the surest way of guaranteeing continuing success. So once again - those of you not paying a subscription please consider whether you can do so now.

OBITUARIES

Martin Clemens AOM, CBE, MC, LM (1915-2009)



When we were raising funds for the Portugal Place clubhouse back in 1988/89 we received a cheque for £1,002, being the cost of 2 shares, and a letter requesting that the share holding be recorded as a joint holding between the sender, and another Hawk, John Turnbull, who had been killed in action

in 1942. The sender with a big heart was Martin Clemens, and John Turnbull was not simply a close friend from his Cambridge days, but also, had he survived the war, would have been Martin's brother-in-law

Martin Clemens was born in Scotland. Losing his father at the age of 9 he developed the early diligence and tenacity that was to last his life through. He earned a scholarship to get into Bedford School, followed by another to Christ's College to read Agriculture and Natural Sciences. Here he played rugby, and majored in rowing, earning a place in the trial 8's, and narrowly missing a place in the Blue Boat. He was the reserve for the British Empire games team in 1936, and a life member of Leander.

Having graduated (with a Masters) he obtained a position in the Foreign Office Colonial Service, and was posted to the Solomon Islands. Here he rapidly established a position for himself as a District Officer, and endeared himself to the natives by picking up their language, and showing himself a resourceful, sensitive, and just administrator. It was during this period, on one of his leaves, that he met his future wife, Anne, sister of his great friends, the Turnbull brothers. They were married in 1948.

1942 began one of the most extraordinary periods in his extraordinary career. Sent to Guadalcanal to assist with the evacuation, he found himself stranded there by the sudden Japanese invasion. Nothing daunted he took to the hills with a group of loyal Melanesian scouts and a radio. In the ensuing months he operated a crucial intelligence network, providing the American forces with information on Japanese deployments on both land and sea. Having helped to turn the battle in the Americans' favour he became British Liaison Officer to the US 14th Corps, and commanding officer (as Major) of the Special Service (Commando) battalion. For his contribution and bravery he was awarded the Military Cross, and appointed to the US Legion of Merit

After the war Martin was posted to Palestine (1946-48), and then to Cyprus (1948-60). Both were centres of conflict, and in both he quickly established a rapport with the local populations. Following his belief that you could not understand a people without speaking their language he learnt Arabic in Palestine, and Greek in Cyprus. In both areas he

worked hard to maintain a peace that sadly, in both cases, was not to last. He was awarded the OBE in 1956, which was promoted to CBE in 1960.

In 1960 he retired from the Colonial Service, moving to his wife's family home in Australia, where he took Australian citizenship. He devoted himself to his family, to managing his wife's holdings in Queensland, and to community activities. Among those benefiting from his wise counsel (and generosity) were Austcare, the International Council of Social Services, the Red Cross, and Australia-Britain Society. He was awarded the Medal of the Order of Australia for service to the community in 1993. He was also director of a number of companies.

He is survived by his 4 children, who, in their funeral eulogy summed him up thus: "...valiant, honourable, courageous and loving His sense of responsibility to others was remarkable and his sense of self was evident in his dignity which remained intact to the last. He never wavered from his duties, as a son, a soldier, a leader of men, a husband, father, friend, neighbour and philanthropist but he always said to us that the greatest duty you have is to yourself and you owe it to yourself to do the very best you can "

Major Frank Hamer MC and bar (1919-2009)



From humble beginnings as son of a clerk at a Bolton cotton mill, Frank Hamer won a place at St Catharine's College to read Geography in 1938. He immediately impressed with his sporting ability, winning a Freshman Blue in athletics. His stay in Cambridge was

His stay in Cambridge was precisely one year, and on

the outbreak of war he joined the 4th Durham Survey Regiment RA. Surveying remained his military duty throughout the war - a milieu in which he continually distinguished himself by the coolness with which he discharged his duties under fire. First however he distinguished by his athletic prowess, running up Cheops pyramid, the highest trig point in the area, 3 times in one morning, as he prepared for the siting of guns to the west of Cairo.

At El Alamein throughout the battle he personally supervised the survey of forward positions under heavy shell fire and in close proximity to enemy positions so that our guns could bring down an accurate bombardment on their batteries. This led to the award of his first Military Cross.

Subsequently in Sicily, while under sustained mortar barrage, Hamer with a pair of surveyors carried out observations allowing fire to be trained on an enemy stronghold near Mount Etna. This led to the award of a bar to his MC.

On D-Day Hamer found himself on top of a Sherman tank on a landing craft with shell fire bursting all around and only the gun turret for cover. Dropping off the tank he scrambled ashore through 5 feet of water. Unloading equipment from the tank, a shell burst a few feet above his head, and he took a lump

of shrapnel in the arm. Typically he proceeded with establishing a beacon on the beach as a rallying point before turning to dress his wound.

He was demobilised in 1946 and returned to complete his studies in Cambridge winning a Blue for Soccer, and playing University level cricket also.

After graduating he joined Cadbury in Birmingham. In 1966 he became Personnel Manager and shortly joined the board as Director of Personnel. When Cadbury merged with Schweppes he became Group Personnel Director. He took early retirement in 1980 to support his wife who had suffered a severe stroke.

Frank Hamer died on April 2nd 2009. He is survived by his son and 2 daughters.

Keith Vartan (1932-2008)



Keith Vartan was born into an Anglo-Scottish Nottinghamshire doctor's family. At Uppingham where he was head boy his sporting talent came to the fore when he represented The Rest v Southern Schools at cricket and English Schoolboys v

Scottish Schoolboys at rugby.

Up at Caius, reading Scottish Law "from time to time" he played cricket for Crusaders, and gained his Hockey Blue in 1954 and 1955. He was part of Peter Gales' unbeaten XI who were chosen to test the British Olympic team. He celebrated 2 victories against Oxford and went on to gain 20 caps at left half for Scotland.

Graduating, he chose a career in industry, joining the Metal Box Co. He moved on to a Directorship at Arthur Brown & Co, Secretary to Diners Club International, and ending with spells at the Royal Society, BUPA and the Economist. He retired in 1994.

He was the figure-head of a happy, sports-mad family, with Golf a key pursuit. Sadly his memory deteriorated towards the end of his life, but to those who remembered his earlier years he remained a talented and Hawkish sportsman, always entertaining, and a loyal friend.

lan Thompson became Dean of King's College Chapel in 2005, having previously held posts at Selwyn and Newnham colleges.

During his time in Cambridge Ian was a great supporter of University sport. In particular he played an active role in the Boat

Club, becoming Senior Treasurer of the Combined Boat Clubs. He also worked with the Town rowing clubs to establish a harmonious sharing of the River Cam. In 2008 he was elected an Honorary Hawk for his services to University Sport.

He was found dead at his home in a suspected suicide on Thursday 24th September.


News from the Trust

The Trust will be making its usual disbursements in the Lent Term. The deadline for applications is 13 February 2010. The following notice has been posted on the University Sports web site, and is sent to all Colleges and Sports:

Awards are normally between £100 and £750, but consideration will be given to any exceptional circumstances. There is no application form. Students should apply to the Trust (18 Portugal Place, Cambridge CB5 8AF), in writing (letter, or email: administrator@hawksclub.co.uk) and applications must be supported by letters or emails from (preferably) Senior Tutors, or by other Tutors. In the past, the Trust has accepted endorsements by Senior Treasurers of their sport. However the Trustees wish to identify NEED (not just high costs) therefore College endorsement, in knowledge of individual financial circumstances and the level of support already given or committed by the College is now required."
